III. APPROVAL OF MEETING MINUTES

a. Cultural Arts Commission Meeting Minutes from April 23, 2024

❖ Chairwoman Cookson called for a motion to approve the minutes.

- Commissioner Smeal offered a motion to approve the minutes, as written, from the April 23, 2024, Cultural Arts Commission Meeting.
- Commissioner Foster seconded the motion.

❖ The motion was approved unanimously 5-0.

IV. NEW BUSINESS

a. Iveybrooke Townhomes HOA, Frog Sculpture – Eco District

- Jackson Stephens with the Providence Group came forward to present the item.
- Mr. Stephens reported that Iveybrooke Townhomes is a new construction community in Alpharetta. He presented pictures of the Frog Sculpture and what materials will be used. He stated that the sculpture will be on an eighteen-inch platform that will match the neighborhood sign and will incorporate the Eco District. The sculpture itself will be a humanoid frog with a dragonfly and will be approximately 5 feet 4 inches tall plus the 18-inch platform. The sculpture will be located at the corner of the community and will be at pedestrian level.

CULTURAL ARTS COMMISSION Q & A:

RE: Iveybrooke Townhomes HOA, Frog Sculpture – Eco District

Q How did the design come about and how did you pick the artist? (Genet)

A We wanted a majestic outdoor piece and the frog stood out but we wanted more from the artist. We wanted to keep the nature aspect and he designed this piece for us. (Stephens)

Q Incorporating Art into life, can kids touch it? (Genet)

A There are no sharp edges, but it should not be climbed upon. It is to be observed. (Stephens)

Q Who is responsible for the maintenance of the sculpture? (Cookson)

A The Iveybrooke Townhomes HOA will maintain the sculpture. (Stephens)

Q What materials are being used? Is it solid? (Foster)

A It is made of molded steel, finished to give it an old look. (Stephens)

❖ Chairwoman Cookson called for a motion on the item.

○ Commissioner Patel offered a motion to approve, as presented, the Iveybrooke Townhomes HOA, Frog Sculpture.

○ Commissioner Smeal seconded the motion to approve, as presented, the Iveybrooke Townhomes HOA, Frog Sculpture.

❖ The motion was approved unanimously 5-0.

b. Park Walke, Thompson Street Flats HOA – Butterfly Coneflower Sculpture

- Jackson Stephens with the Providence Group came forward to present this item.
- Mr. Stephens presented The Providence Group is putting the art piece in with partnership from Thompson Street Flats. The piece is not a zoning requirement. The Butterfly Coneflower Sculpture is a reimagination of a piece the artist has made in the past. The Providence Group asked for the piece with modifications to make it different from the other sculpture the artist did. The artist is not a production artist, and he uses reclaimed metals for his sculptures. The board and the communities HOA has approved the piece, they stated they wanted something unique. There is only one other sculpture in the US. The maintenance will be taken care of by the Thompson Street Flats HOA.

CULTURAL ARTS COMMISSON Q & A:

RE: Park Walke, Thompson Street Flats HOA – Butterfly Coneflower Sculpture

Q What materials are used in making the sculpture? (Patel)

A Reclaimed Steel. (Stephens)

Q This is a premium street for Alpharetta. This is sort of an off the shelf sculpture. Would love to see something more unique. Would that be possible? (Smeal)

A We wanted to do a native to Georgia flower. Everything is custom cut. (Stephens)

C It is a template, struggling with it due to the location of the piece. (Smeal)

Q Impressed with the thought, is there something that can be done to make it more unique? (Genet)

A The artist can only do the one here in Alpharetta. He would only use the colors he and flower here. (Stephens)

❖ Chairwoman Cookson called for a motion on the item.

- Commissioner Smeal offered a motion to defer the Park Walke, Thompson Street Flats HOA – Butterfly Coneflower Sculpture to the next regular meeting.

- Commissioner Foster seconded the motion to defer the Park Walke, Thompson Street Flats HOA – Butterfly Coneflower Sculpture to the next regular meeting.

❖ Chairwoman Cookson opened the item up for discussion.

DISCUSSION:

- Chairwoman Cookson asked if there is an agreement in place with the HOA and the maintenance of the sculpture. Stephens stated that he would need to check. He knows that the HOA approved the sculpture.
- Commissioner Foster commented that the sculpture is too static, it needs to move, it needs to be more interesting. She also asked if the artist had been chosen and Stephens stated that the artist had been chosen and paid. Foster continued to state that the piece needs to be more unique and there should have been some line drawings or mockups. Stephens stated that they started the process with the artist before approval. Foster stated that the butterfly is too generic and wanted to know if we could suggest a different animal or insect. Stephens stated that the wings have already been cut. Foster suggested additional pieces to make it more dynamic.
- Commissioner Genet suggested using a dogwood as opposed to a coneflower to bring it more to Georgia. She also suggested to angle the piece. Stephens stated that angling the piece would be easy, redesign would be difficult. Genet stated that the pad was already in place, then she asked how they were going to incorporate it into the landscaping? She stated it looks like an afterthought.
- Commissioner Smeal stated that she is struggling most with the location due to it being a high traffic area in Alpharetta.
- Kim Manning came forward and stated that the Cultural Arts Division will work with The Providence Group to get something more unique and have them present it at the next regular meeting.

- ❖ Chairwoman Cookson called for a vote on the motion to defer the Park Walke, Thompson Street Flats HOA – Butterfly Coneflower Sculpture to the next regular meeting.
- ❖ The motion was approved unanimously 5-0.

c. The 1858, Integrated Architectural Piece with Historical Plaque

- Pat Corkill and Patti Huxford presented the architectural piece.
- Corkill stated that the inspiration for the piece is from the founding of Alpharetta in 1858. The piece will be mounted with a granite veneer wall to match the gates for the homes. The material will be an aluminum water wheel with a plaque. The plaque will be assisted with the historical society. The piece will have a light so it can be visible at night. The HOA will do the maintenance of the piece.
- ❖ Chairwoman Cookson called for a motion.
 - Commissioner Smeal offered a motion to approve, as presented, The 1858, Integrated Architectural Piece with Historical Plaque.
 - Commissioner Foster seconded the motion to approve, as presented, The 1858, Integrated Architectural Piece with Historical Plaque.

2024-2026 Bi-Yearly Outdoor On-Loan Sculpture Program - RIFF Exhibit

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Review and approve the new sculpture exhibit with proposed new locations for the bi-yearly public art program. The staff is in favor of the ten (10) proposed sculptures and locations for the *RIFF* Exhibit with Arts Alpharetta, Inc. for the bi-yearly Outdoor-On-Loan agreement. If the Cultural Arts Commission approves, sculpture installation will take place approximately September 2024.

ITEM DESCRIPTION:

Bi-Yearly, the City of Alpharetta contracts with Arts Alpharetta for the Outdoor-On-Loan Sculpture Exhibit. This year's exhibit is proposing a collection of ten (10) new sculptures with five (5) replacement locations and five (5) new locations.

This is our largest exhibit installation to date due to the revised agreement for the Outdoor-On-Loan Sculpture Exhibit. In past years we had a yearly agreement (budgeted at \$85,000.00 each budget year). Arts Alpharetta and Staff recommend revising the bi-yearly agreement (budgeted at \$45,000.00 for each year / Total \$90,000.00 every two years). The installation and deinstallation of the sculptures on a yearly basis could not be properly supported or promoted. The new bi-yearly agreement allows for lower budget expenditures while giving a larger exhibit to promote.

City of Alpharetta, Arts Alpharetta, and Alpharetta Convention & Visitors Bureau partner on an Art Walk Brochure that is available for locals and promotes tourism. The program supports the City's vision of promoting and supporting Arts & Culture through Public Art; and the 2024 City Council Priorities and Annual Action Plan supporting: Downtown Alpharetta, Strategic Growth and Redevelopment, Communications that Connect, and Recreation, Parks & Culture.

The services provided by Arts Alpharetta, Inc. provide turn-key service for all aspects of the project. Services include all correspondence with artists (ranging from the online call for artists, to rental agreements, and payments), duration, installation, and deinstallation of the art, and marketing. Although Arts Alpharetta, Inc. is contracted for the Outdoor-On-Loan Sculpture Exhibit, the non-profit organization spends all the funding received on the project expenditures and the turn-key service. Arts Alpharetta volunteers their time to the project to make sure the Outdoor-On-Loan Exhibit is a success.

The agreement is valid for a period of 2 years, with the exhibit on display for calendar years 2024-2026, after which the City and Arts Alpharetta, Inc. may discuss a fifth Outdoor-On-Loan exhibit for Fiscal Years 2026-2027, calendar years 2026-2028.

The new Outdoor-On-Loan exhibit is called *RIFF*, which is the theme for the fourth exhibit. In conjunction with Alpharetta's "Alpharetta Music City" initiative, *RIFF* represents a repeated phrase in music, free-styling, and an individual artistic expression often described as freelance. *RIFF* can also be an acronym for Representing Inspiration in Free Form, with a tone of independence within the theme.

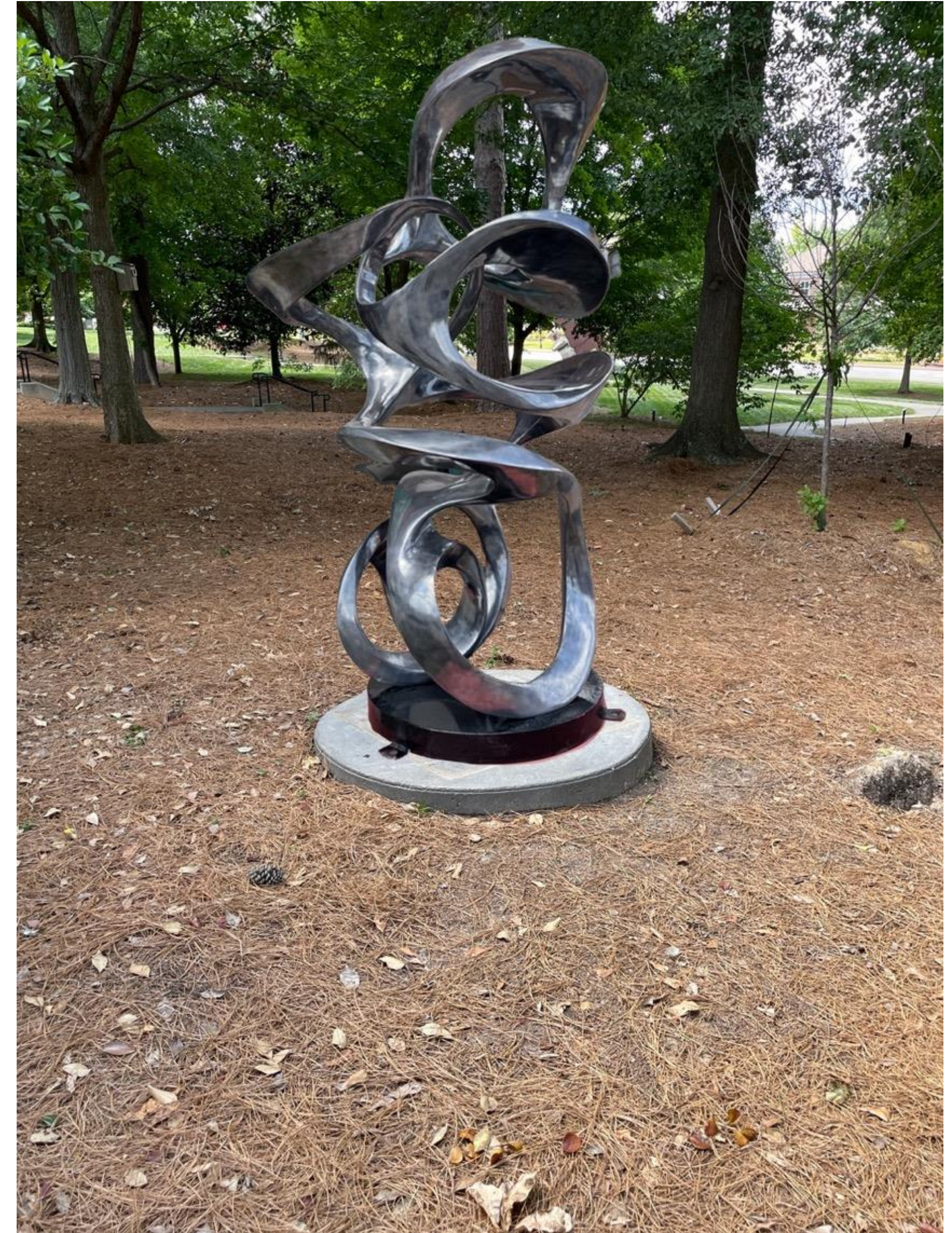

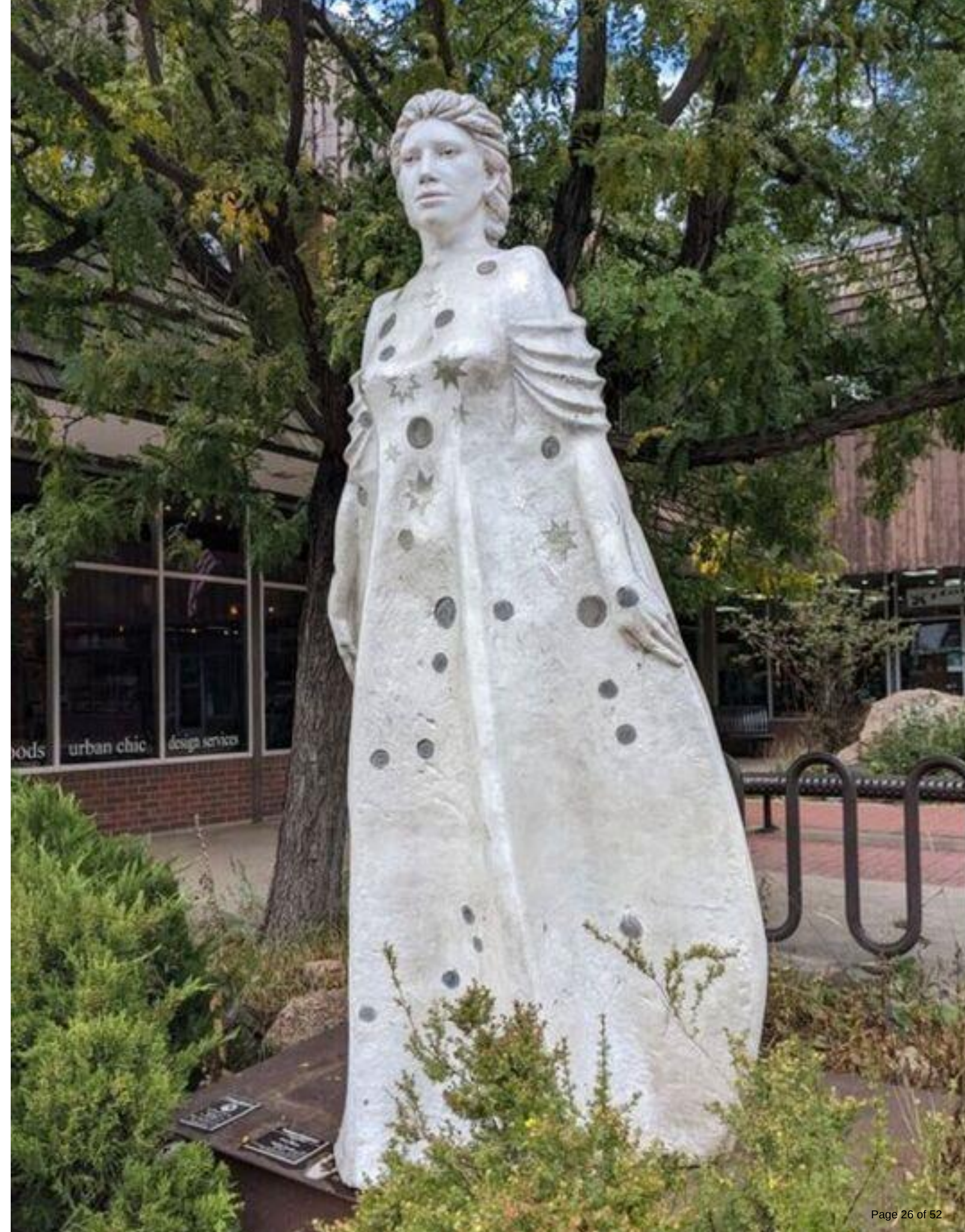

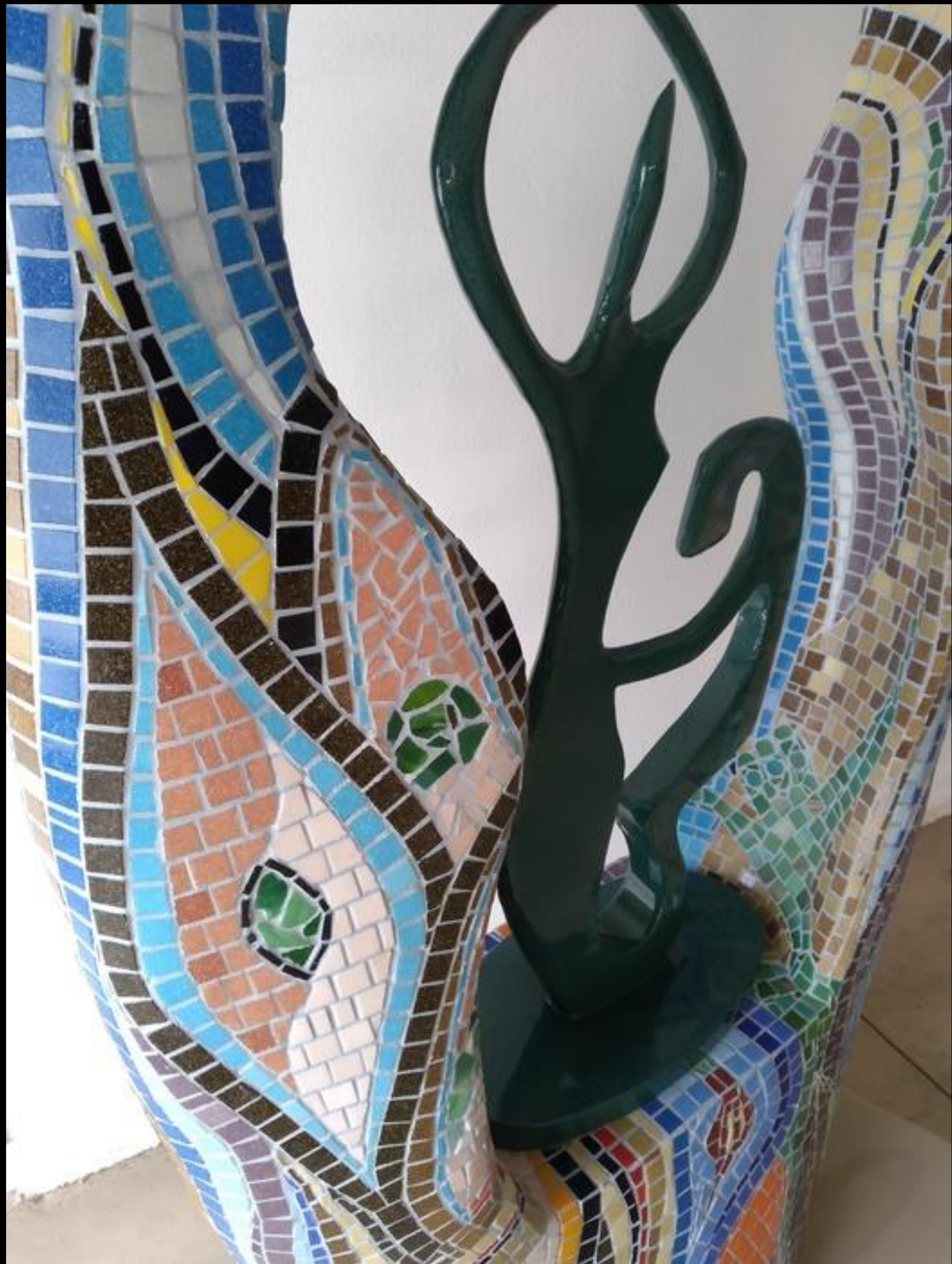
